Annual Meeting Success!



The Annual Membership meeting of Entranosa Water & Wastewater Association on Saturday Sept. 25 was a terrific success. This meeting marked the 40th anniversary of the founding of Entranosa by the Horton family in 1981. Approximately 175 members attended the event, to lunch on green chile cheeseburgers and potato salad grilled up by the Owl Café in Albuquerque. The meeting wasn't just social however. Members got a sound financial health report on the association from Pulakos CPAs, Brad Stewart, and a sustainability report on the Estancia Basin water from board member and retired engineer, Paul Gorder. In 2020 during the worst of COVID 19

pandemic, members increased their water usage by 1,315 gallons a month with revenues to Entranosa rose to \$3.3 million dollars from \$2.9 million the year before. CEO Jack Crider briefed the membership on the accomplishments of the past year,

including the construction of the Section 6, 500,000 gallon storage reservoir. Another similar sized storage tank is planned for 2022 in the same location. He also reminded members that Entranosa staff was busy in 2020 and 2021 drilling the new East Pine Canyon Well, which produces 400 gallons per minute (gpm), and building 10 new

transmission lines totaling 20,200 feet of pipelines.

One of the most important

aspects of the Annual Meeting is election of Board of Directors. Members returned Rik Thompson to the board, and elected a new member to the board, Joelle Hertel. She replaces long-serving board member Rob Baracker. Joelle is a retired civil engineer with significant experience managing large

engineering projects for a national firm. She has also served for the past five years on the Bernalillo County District 5 Planning Commission. She brings to the board additional technical expertise in water systems and construction. She has been a member of Entranosa since 1999. We thank Rob Baracker for his selfless service to the board.

Answer to Questions about Campbell Ranch

"It is important

for all prospective developers to understand the following:

Entranosa Water and Wastewater Association provides quality water service to our existing membership. All new services must pay for their improvements to the system. This means that any costs incurred to provide new services must be borne by the developer through a development agreement or new subscriber membership. This is stated in the first paragraph of Entranosa's Development Policy. East Mountain developers over the past 40 years have funded significant infrastructure to provide service to their subdivisions. They must pay for engineering, water rights, line upgrades, water storage and booster stations to accommodate their developments. Once the infrastructure is completed, those assets are transferred to Entranosa. The proposed changes to the Campbell Ranch master plan will divide the large development into more manageable subdivisions, which will require approval on a case by case basis. Entranosa has been negotiating on development requirements for a 200-home subdivision within the Campbell Ranch property but has not yet signed any agreement.
